Heindel also mentions that staff will monitor ice conditions and ice thickness throughout the season. The spaces are closed once the ice thickness is below 10".

In regards to snowbank rinks, Parks Staff pack the snow and flood the bases to build the ice to a smooth surface which can take many days and is dependent on the weather. If it's cold, more than one flood can happen each day.

Once the ice is safe for skating, Parks staff regularly clear the snow and hose flood the surface with their water trucks.

These spaces are constantly monitored to ensure safe thicknesses and if the base

(grass, asphalt or concrete) are not fully covered, the space will be closed until the ice can be built back to a safe thickness Heindel says that there are many benefits to having outdoor rinks such as these.

"These spaces are typically oriented to families with small children intended for skating and children's games rather than fast paced ice hockey."
